CFLA-FCAB Indigenous Matters Committee Steps to Reconcili-Action

Background

In 2017, the Canadian Federation of Library Associations /Fédération Canadienne des Associations de Bibliothèques Indigenous Matters Committee published its Truth and Reconciliation Report which included a list of recommendations on what the library community can do. Since that time, over thirty Canadian libraries, Associations, and Institutions have endorsed the report. Following a survey of endorsing organizations in 2023, the Indigenous Matters Committee has created a list of actions taken in the Canadian Library Landscape which may be a good fit for your organization's work towards reconciliation.

Listed below are a number of highlights, including the contact information for those who helped guide these processes through. Look over them, find inspiration, and feel free to contact those involved to see the challenges and opportunities they found in responding to the 2017 report.

KEEP YOURSELF ACCOUNTABLE

Working towards any goal can be much more effective when holding yourself accountable.

The Federation of Ontario Public Libraries, in their Reconciliation Action Plan put their action front and center, noting both the action they planned to take and the current status of each action. Actions included the creation of a working group, advocacy goals, and support for members. The Reconciliation Action Plan was shared with all their members.
